
## March28, 1940

On the night of March 28, 1940, the British freighter SS Esmond, out of St John's Nfld, was bound for Halifax with a cargo of newsprint. Pilot Vessel No. 2, the Hebridean, was in the approaches to Halifax Harbour ready to place a pilot on board the Esmond to safely guide her into the harbour. As the tender from the Hebridean came to the Esmond, for reasons never known, the Hebridean crossed the bow of the Esmond and was struck. The pilot and oarsmen were thrown from the tender and then rescued from the water by the Esmond. Two crewmen who were on the deck of the Hebridean were also plucked from the water. Witnesses reported that the Hebridean sank almost immediately. No wreckage and no victims of the Hebridean were ever recovered. Nine brave souls perished that night while working in the service of their country. The tragedy devastated Herring Cove and its families. Today many descendants of the pilots still live in Herring Cove and surrounding areas.
